THANK SUPPORTING EQUITAS

Members of the Equitas team often mention that their work with human rights defenders around the world makes them so grateful for what they have, and for having the very good fortune of living in Canada. We are very fortunate to have all the freedoms and rights that we do; the right to vote; freedom of expression; freedom of association; the right to practice our religion... the list goes on and on. Some stories truly touch our hearts and remind us of our fortune in so many ways. Let me tell you the remarkable story about Joséphine Yameogo, from the West African country of Burkina Faso, and how your support has helped Equitas make an incredible difference.



Our story begins in a garage in the outskirts of the capital city of Ouagadougou. Running the garage is Joséphine Yameogo.

Born in a small village into a very large extended family, in a society where "girls were expected to serve the boys," Joséphine has been fighting for equality her entire life. At the age of just one month, she was promised in marriage to a man over 40 years her senior.

When she turned 17, she was taken to meet her 60 year-old future husband. Understanding that marrying him would take away her own freedom, Joséphine did the unthinkable: she refused her family's wishes, and instead married another man of her own choice.

The consequences were grave. Joséphine was disowned, banished by her own family, unable to return to her village.

However, Joséphine Yameogo is one extraordinary woman. Facing tremendous opposition, and with limited resources and three small children at home, she continued to defy expectations, choosing to pursue her interests and a career traditionally reserved for men. She decided to train as a mechanic.

Joséphine became the first woman in the country to work in this trade and open



her own garage. The impact this had on her life and circumstances was considerable. Now actively contributing to the family income, she could help to send her children to school and provide a better life for them. She was also being included in the decision making within her household. Joséphine began to become aware of the broader potential of what she was doing. If women had access to more professions, more women would have an income and security. They would also have greater control over their lives and be able to participate more

actively in the development of their communities.

Realizing that she had to change more than her own personal situation, Joséphine decided to form a group

called the Association of Lady Mechanics of Faso (A.M.F.) to help women from very poor areas of Ouagadougou, often with limited schooling and families to look after, to try and gain access to nontraditional professions. She began to organize informal meetings to raise women's awareness of their rights. But with no resources and no training, her impact was limited. Frustrated with the lack of

progress, Joséphine was certain of one thing: "If these women knew their rights, they would fight to succeed!"

EQUITAS AND YOUCHANGING THE WORLD TOGETHER

Fortunately, one of Equitas' local partners met Joséphine, and saw the extraordinary potential in her and her work. He recommended that she participate in Equitas' regional training session for community trainers. While she was very keen

to attend, it was not an obvious match. A mechanic at a human rights training program? Our partner persisted... and we took a chance.

Joséphine did not disappoint. Her participation in Equitas' program taught her about the **tremendous power of human rights education to transform attitudes and values.** Armed with the knowledge and skills to make

human rights education more 'user-friendly', she set out to turn that knowledge into action in her community.

Leading by example and using the Equitas model, Joséphine made it her mission to create new opportunities for women and support women who wanted to break free from the stereotypical roles society imposed on them. She coached women through difficult situations with their spouses and parents. She went from garage to garage, doing what she calls "garage advocacy", to help find employ-

ment for women who had trained as mechanics but had never worked in the field. She began working to change men's attitudes towards women, to dismantle stereotypes

and to increase men's willingness to allow their wives and daughters to attend meetings and go to trade schools. She promoted the creation of additional women's associations — of industrial painters, and electricians — to provide a nation-wide network of support and solidarity, to promote equality, and to make people aware of the discriminatory sexual division of labour in her country.

Joséphine and other women like her in Burkina Faso are incredible trail-blazers. Thanks to all their efforts and dedication over the past decade or so, there has been a truly remarkable increase in the number of women working in non-traditional professions, from 15 to 1,500 across Burkina Faso.

IN HAITI

Together with our local partners, Equitas is working to involve displaced persons in post-earthquake reconstruction, with a citizen participation program to help them take control of their lives, speak up against violence and actively participate in local efforts to rebuild and develop the country.

IN EGYPT

Following his participation in Equitas' International Human Rights Training Program, a participant and his organization have been working tirelessly in a conservative and poverty-stricken region to increase women's political participation. Of the 30,000 women he reached, 19,550 cast ballots in the following elections, a resounding success given the region's previous low voter turnout of 17%.

IN CANADA, over 70,000 children learn how to *Play it Fair!* each year in over 350 day camps and after-school sites across the country. *Play it Fair!* is an

innovative program that equips staff working with children with the skills to lead activities that promote respect, fairness, acceptance, inclusion and cooperation encouraging the healthy development of children and building stronger more inclusive communities. Children play the games, discuss how they feel, and work together to solve conflicts.
